## Double Object Pronouns



**¿RECUERDAS?** pp. 358, 360 You have already learned to use **direct** and **indirect object pronouns** to avoid redundancy.

You can also use these two kinds of object pronouns together.

When you do, you put the **indirect** object **before** the **direct** object.

Ya tengo el libro de cuentos. **Me lo** prestó mi amiga Julia.

*I already have the book of short stories. My friend Julia lent **it** to **me**.*

Comprendemos los poemas porque **nos los** explicó el profesor.

*We understand the poems because the teacher explained **them** to **us**.*

There is a special rule for verbs with two pronouns when both are **third person**: change the **indirect** object pronoun to **se**.

**le + lo = se lo**

¿**Le** mostraste el dibujo a Carlos?

*Did you show the drawing to Carlos?*

Sí, **se lo** mostré.

*Yes, I showed **it** to **him**.*

¿**Les** diste el guión a las actrices?

*Did you give the script to the actresses?*

Sí, **se lo** di.

*Yes, I gave **it** to **them**.*

Don't forget to put **object pronouns** before all **conjugated verbs** except **affirmative commands**, where you attach them. When you attach them, put an accent mark on the verb.

Mauricio quiere usar nuestro carro.

*Mauricio wants to use our car.*

**Préstenselo.**

*Lend **it** to **him**.*

Remember that when you use **object pronouns** with **infinitives** and the **-ndo forms**, you can put the pronouns either before or after the verb.

Me gusta esa computadora.

**Me la** quiero comprar.

*I like that computer. I want to buy **it** for **myself**.*

Me gusta esa computadora.

Quiero **comprármela**.

*I like that computer. I want to buy **it** for **myself**.*

Mamá **nos los** está

preparando.

*Mom is preparing **them** for **us**.*

Mamá está

**preparándonoslos**.

*Mom is preparing **them** for **us**.*
